WGO Practice Guideline - Celiac Disease. Definition: Celiac disease (CD) is a chronic, multiple-organ autoimmune disease that affects the small intestine in genetically predisposed children and adults. It is precipitated by the ingestion of gluten-containing foods [].It may also be referred to as celiac sprue, gluten-sensitive enteropathy, or nontropical sprue.

Celiac disease (CD) is a chronic (long-term) digestive disease during which patients have irritation (inflammation) of the small intestine, which causes difficulty with absorbing nutrients from food. Patients with CD often have other family members with the condition and are therefore susceptible to this disease.

The clinical presentation of celiac disease varies widely, and the onset of the disease or symptoms may occur at any time in life. Many patients with celiac disease have few gastrointestinal symptoms or present with extraintestinal manifestations, while a minority of patients have malabsorption (classic celiac disease).

Celiac Disease: Ten Things That Every Gastroenterologist

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The guidelines of the European Society of Pediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology, and Nutrition allow for diagnosis of celiac disease without biopsies in children with symptoms and levels of immunoglobulin A against tissue-transglutaminase (TGA-IgA) 10-fold or more the upper limit of normal (ULN), confirmed by detection of endomysium antibodies (EMA) and positivity for HLA-DQ2/DQ8.
