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### Fasting What The Bible Teaches

For New Testament believers, fasting was neither commanded nor forbidden in the Bible. While early Christians were not required to fast, many practiced prayer and fasting regularly. Jesus himself affirmed in Luke 5:35 that after his death, fasting would be appropriate for his followers: "The days will come when the bridegroom is taken away from them, and then they will fast in those days" (ESV) .

### What the Bible Says About Spiritual Fasting

Fasting and Abstinence — Although the word “fast” is used as abstaining from food in the Bible and does not refer to giving up other things, during a fast one can practice abstinence from other pleasures as well, such as entertainment, TV, hobbies and sex, as spoken about in 1 Corinthians 7:1-5.

### What the Bible Says About Fasting - Bible Resources

Fasting is not an end unto itself, but a means of focusing our minds and bodies for a spiritual reason. Whenever you fast, do so for a reason that is mentioned or modeled in the Bible. Here are ten primary purposes for fasting mentioned in Scripture:<sup>1</sup>. 1. To strengthen prayer (e.g., see Ezra 8:23)

Fasting means self-denial by going without food for a period of time. Fasting may be total or partial -- avoiding certain foods or eating smaller than normal quantities. The origin of fasting as a religious practice is unclear, but both the Old and New Testaments of the Bible mention a number of instances of fasting for various reasons.

### What Does the Bible Say About Fasting?

As a result, they don't know why fasting and praying are important, what the Bible teaches about fasting, or how to fast. To many, fasting sounds like drudgery -- or a form of religious works. To others, fasting sounds extremely difficult. People tend to stand in awe at reports of those who have fasted for several weeks.

### The Power of Prayer and Fasting: Spiritual Life in God

At the same time, the Bible presents fasting as something that is good, profitable, and beneficial. The book of Acts records believers fasting before they made important decisions (Acts 13:2; 14:23). Fasting and prayer are often linked together (Luke 2:37; 5:33). Too often, the focus of fasting is on the lack of food.

This leads, then, to the ultimate reward of Christian fasting, and the “best of all” purposes we highlighted above: God himself. More important than God's earthly guidance and protection and deliverance and provision is our eternal reception of and rejoicing in him. God made us eaters and drinkers to teach us about himself.

### The Secret Benefit of Fasting | Desiring God

Although the Bible doesn't give a direct command on this issue, examples of fasting appear in both the Old and the New Testaments. One of the most telling passages in which fasting is mentioned is Matthew 6:16, where Jesus is teaching His disciples basic principles of godly living.

### Why Should I Fast? 7 Examples of Fasting in the Bible

Fasting is for Christians, and we find examples of it throughout the Bible. In Old Testament times members of the entire nation of Israel were required to afflict their souls once a year by fasting on the tenth day of the seventh month, the Day of Atonement, as we read in Leviticus 16. In Acts 27 this annual affliction was called a fast.

Question: "How to fast—what does the Bible say?" Answer: The New Testament nowhere commands followers of Jesus Christ to fast. In fact, even in the Old Testament, the Jews were only commanded to fast on one day out of the year, the Day of Atonement (Leviticus 23:27, 29, 32).

The Bible doesn't command New Testament believers (like us) to fast, but still seems to assume that we will (Mark 2:20). The Bible doesn't prescribe only one way to fast. For example: Daniel went three weeks without any tasty food (Dan. 10:3). Fasting doesn't stand on its own; it is always linked with prayer.
