St. John Climacus received his name "Climacus" ("of the Ladder") because of this work, and his writing The Ladder (later called The Ladder of Divine Ascent) has been compared to the Holy Prophet and God-seer Moses receiving the Law. This work was initially used by monastics. In fact it is read by monastics to this day during the Great Fast.

After entering the monastery of St. Catherine on Mt. Sinai c. 600, John withdrew to live as a hermit in a nearby cell. He was chosen abbot c. 639 and ruled until shortly before he died; the book was written during this period. John's "Ladder" symbolizes the Old Testament patriarch Jacob's dream of a climb to heaven.
