Stanislavski's system is a systematic approach to training actors that the Russian theatre practitioner Konstantin Stanislavski developed in the first half of the twentieth century. His system cultivates what he calls the "art of experiencing" (with which he contrasts the "art of representation"). It mobilises the actor's conscious thought and will in order to activate other, less-controllable ...

To hammer home this difference - Stanislavski believed that all actions on stage must have an inner

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justification, but Brecht was more interested in showing how those very actions were often unjustified in a context of social and political systems. Neither were wrong; they had different goals.

What are the differences in the acting techniques of ...

The Stanislavsky system requires that an actor utilize, among other things, his emotional memory (i.e., his recall of past experiences and emotions). The actor's entrance onto the stage is considered to be not a beginning of the action or of his life as the character but a continuation of the set of preceding circumstances.
